

Dear Friends,

Another church year is now fast upon us. Another year of meetings, pot-luck dinners, singing, ringing bells, lighting candles, Sunday school, Bible study, special services, men's fellowship, women's circle groups, mission events, and of course, repairing and beautifying the facility...and all this just to name the one's that initially come to mind.

Hey! Wait a minute! That can't be what I'm thinking? Nothing is happening...right? I pulled the first few sentences from an old September newsletter. Back then it was true, but today, not so sure? Things are much different going into this 2020-21 church year. Although I feel optimistic, I would not be honest if I didn't share that I do feel a sense of sadness over the state of our current situation. Although the church will be ready for reentry on the 13th, it will not be the same. For those who might come to Sunday worship, there will even be, in our sanctuary, isolation and limited human interaction. Well, except for a "high, how are you doing," from across the pews. Not how most of us would define church fellowship. We crave human interaction. We crave being able to share in each other's stories, ideas, hopes and dreams. We crave laughing together. So what do we do in this atmosphere of limited interaction? What can we do in this environment of isolation that might strengthen your spirit? What might we do so that when things get back to normal, we will be ready to serve the Lord better and more fully then we have ever done before?

I recently read an article from Alan Wilson, DMin. He writes the following: "These are strange and unusual days we are living in, days where our freedom has been greatly curtailed. For some, isolation can be exceedingly difficult psychologically and emotionally, causing them to feel lonely and disconnected, especially if they are living by themselves. When our emotions are overcome with negativity, it is difficult to maintain a spiritual perspective. One might come to believe or feel that God is distant, not in control, or does not love us." How can we remain spiritually and emotionally faithful to God as we find ourselves in a world that, at the moment, is much different?

If we recall the life of the Apostle Paul, we know that most of his words of encouragement were written in isolation. Much of what we read in the Pauline letters were written while he was in prison. What did Paul do in his prison cell, in isolation, that might be an encouragement to us? Paul always made room for God. Know matter what situation he found himself, making room for God was always on his agenda. The same should be true for us. He made his cell his sanctuary. He made his cell a prayer space, a space where there were few limits on his continuing faithfulness to a faithful God. He journaled, writing wonderful words of faith and insight. He prayed and sang songs of praise. He even ministered to other prisoners. He ministered to the jail officials entrusted to watch him, feed him, and tend to his critical needs. He did a lot in isolation. He always had room for God and to serve Him faithfully regardless of his situation.

Just two things to end. First, consider your "confinement" in isolation an opportunity to deepen your relationship with God. Secondly, view your present situation as an opportunity to encourage others. Encourage others with cards, letters, email messages, and phone calls. Make room for God and be like God to others.


