What can we learn from an atheist?

Penn Jillette, the atheist illusionist and comedian, has said: "I don't respect people who don't proselytize. I don't respect them at all. If you believe that there's a heaven and hell and people could be going to hell or not getting eternal life or whatever, and you think that it's not really worth telling them this because it would make it socially awkward. ... How much do you have to hate somebody to believe that everlasting life is possible and not tell them that?"

There is one thing that atheists do better than many of the believing Christians. It is that they truly believe that they don't believe... in God. In some ways the atheist does a better job believing that they don't believe than we do believing that we do believe. We can learn something from the atheist. We can learn to be more passionate about our faith and what we believe. Penn Jillette got it right. "How much do you have to hate somebody to believe that everlasting life is possible and not tell them that?"

Kenda Dean made an observation about what the church teaches her young people and a problem that results from that teaching. She observed that the problem doesn't seem to be that churches are teaching young people badly, but that we are doing an exceedingly good job of teaching youth what we really believe; namely, that Christianity is not a big deal, that God requires little, and the church is a helpful social institution filled with people focused primarily on "folks like us."

Wow...just think...to believe with the passion and conviction of an atheist.


